My brothers and sisters, do you with your acts of favoritism really believe in our glorious Lord Jesus Christ? For if a person with gold rings and in fine clothes comes into your assembly, and if a poor person in dirty clothes also comes in, and if you take notice of the one wearing the fine clothes and say, "Have a seat here, please," while to the one who is poor you say, "Stand there," or, "Sit at my feet," have you not made distinctions among yourselves, and become judges with evil thoughts? Listen, my beloved brothers and sisters. Has not God chosen the poor in the world to be rich in faith and to be heirs of the kingdom that he has promised to those who love him? But you have dishonored the poor. Is it not the rich who oppress you? Is it not they who drag you into court? Is it not they who blaspheme the excellent name that was invoked over you? You do well if you really fulfill the royal law according to the scripture, "You shall love your neighbor as yourself." But if you show partiality, you commit sin and are convicted by the law as transgressors. For whoever keeps the whole law but fails in one point has become accountable for all of it. [For the one who said, "You shall not commit adultery," also said, "You shall not murder." Now if you do not commit adultery but if you murder, you have become a transgressor of the law. Jesus set out and went away to the region of Tyre. He entered a house and did not want anyone to know he was there. Yet he could not escape notice, but a woman whose little daughter had an unclean spirit immediately heard about him, and she came and bowed down at his feet. Now the woman was a Gentile, of Syrophoenician origin. She begged him to cast the demon out of her daughter. He said to her, "Let the children be fed first, for it is not fair to take the children's food and throw it to the dogs." But she answered him, "Sir, even the dogs under the table eat the children's crumbs." Then he said to her, "For saying that, you may go-the demon has left your daughter." 

Sunday School & Education for Children and Adults

17. Comment on one event or experience over the last year that has significantly contributed to the spiritual life of the congregation.

The global COVID-19 pandemic was the definitive event/ experience in the last year for Old First. It changed everything about our worship, our fellowship, and church administration. As the United States begins to transition to post-COVID life, it may be hard to remember that New York City was ground zero for the proliferation of the virus in the country. For many of our congregants, the physical memories are of vacant and quiet streets but for the never-ending sound of ambulances. Emotional memories are of fear: fear of going outside, of touching anything, of breathing, of not knowing, of being isolated. When an emergency-room physician of our membership, who attended to COVID patients, tested positive and became sick, we worried about her, her spouse and children. When we needed our spiritual support community the most, we had it the least, and, in the middle of this, our pastor took his planned retirement and departed without us being able to say thank you or goodbye in any personal way.

COVID's contribution to the spiritual life of the church can be seen in our immediate transition to an engaging on-line worship experience. This service, which has been directed primarily by the elders, has encouraged each of us to practice communion in our homes, and most congregants have participated in it in some way. Congregants' contributions have included production, scripture readings, prayers of the people, deacons' messaging, special music, choral arrangements and dramatic readings. It also enabled these contributions and involvement in our worship by the Old First "diaspora," those members who for one reason or another have left our physical community but miss our spiritual community. While we long to be back together physically, to worship together, to meet with each other, and participate in all aspects of church life, our worship response to the pandemic has bound us tighter together. Rather than just maintain our community of Jesus Christ in Brooklyn, it has enhanced it.

18. Buildings: Please describe church-owned or rented buildings and purpose.

All are church-owned:

Sanctuary - Capacity 506 (including balcony); Roosevelt Pipe Organ, historic stained-glass windows, Steinway grand piano; used for worship services, concerts, community meetings and other arts events.

Lower Hall, Kitchen and Parlor - Capacity 100, grand piano; used for worship services, coffee hour, church dinners, book readings, music rehearsals by local groups, Alcoholics Anonymous, yoga classes, wedding receptions and parties.

Upper Hall - Capacity 150 (including balcony), grand piano; used for worship services, concerts, community events and music rehearsals by local groups. Also used for Sunday School and by the Old First Nursery School, a major tenant.

Pastor's office - Currently above the Narthex in the main sanctuary building. Consideration is being given to locating the pastor's office to a more accessible location on the main floor.

The **church office** is located off the Lower Hall, next to the Carroll Street entrance to the building.

There is a **garden** with play area adjacent to the Lower Hall, and accessible through the kitchen and from the Carroll Street gate.

Electrical/Lighting Upgrade for the building (Fall 2021 - Spring 2022). Full electrical upgrade for all spaces in our building, and restoration of historic light fixtures in the Sanctuary. This is funded by a grant, matching funds from a bequest and other donors. Total estimated budget: \$1.1 million

We are planning a second fundraising effort to raise money for the restoration of our stained glass windows and are in the early stages of forming a 501c3 for this purpose as well as for ongoing preservation and restoration.

23. What leadership roles do women currently fill in your church?

Our church currently has its first woman pastor, our interim pastor Jane Ann Groom. She has imparted a new vision of God as both Father and Mother to us all, and has introduced the use of Anglican Psalms, used in Canada, which have been fitted with gender-neutral pronouns. Our music director is a highly skilled organist and musician who started her own baroque music group of great acclaim four years ago. Additionally, our Financial Operations Director is a woman of many years' experience, who also serves on our Finance and Administration Committee, a vital position on both counts. Our Office Coordinator is also a woman of much experience and ability, and she has added to our well-run church office and programs. However, it should be noted that although a majority of parishioners are female, and women make up a majority of Sunday School teachers, the Consistory is divided more along traditional lines, with all the Elders being male, except for one, and all the Deacons being female, with one exception. There has been gender diversity in the past, however.

Old First has close ties with Greenwood Baptist Church, Congregation Beth Elohim, and the Dawood Mosque in Brooklyn. We have hosted ministers, rabbis, and imams from these institutions, and have often shared Good Friday and Martin Luther King services with them. Our vocal groups have performed for a number of local RCA congregations, including those at Flatlands Reformed Church and Grace Reformed Church. During the pandemic, these collaborations have been severely curtailed.

Brooklyn Relief Kitchen - feeding the hungry in the greater Brooklyn community with fresh-cooked meals and groceries

Our outreach activities include music programs, such as the Baroquelyn music series and the Jingle Bell Jamboree; social welfare programs such as the Brooklyn Relief Kitchen and summer respite shelter; arts events such as author readings and art shows; and Girl Scout Troop 2302, which is hosted by the church but largely comprised of children from the greater community. Most of our neighborhood is unchurched, so any time we open our doors to the public and welcome them into our space or programs, we are reaching into the mission field.

1. What is the stated mission, vision or purpose of your congregation?

Old First Reformed Church is a community of Jesus Christ in Brooklyn, offering a space of unconditional welcome, a practice of worship and service and a vision of God's love and justice for all.

We are a diverse, open and supportive church community. Our 200 members and adherents are from all walks of life and reflect a diversity of backgrounds.

Old First is part of the Reformed Church in America (RCA), a mainline Protestant denomination with direct roots in the Reformation of the 16th Century. We are one of the founding congregations of the RCA, the oldest Protestant denomination in America with a continuing ministry, and were established in 1654, making us – with our sister congregations in Flatbush and Flatlands – the oldest in Brooklyn.

We embrace the historic doctrines of the Apostles and Nicene Creeds as well as the unity and reconciliation of the Belhar Confession. We embrace the following five missions:

To offer God's word, prayer, the sacraments, and discipleship;

To offer outreach, education, fellowship, and music;

To offer sanctuary to anyone seeking spirituality and hope;

To offer hospitality to community groups and the arts; and

To care for the gifts we have been given through our Reformed Church, including our historic sanctuary and building.

Whoever you are and whatever your story, we have a place for you and are ready to welcome you.

2. Describe the strengths of your church, the best of what you are as a community, and what you can offer a new pastor.

We regard the following as significant strengths of Old First:

The congregation shares a well-defined and articulated mission;

There are strong bonds of affection among the members of the congregation, for the congregation as a body and for the church as a local institution;

We have a talented and enthusiastic leadership team, both in the consistory and the various groups and committees;

We have a very good administrative staff; and

We have multiple and varied connections to the Park Slope and wider Brooklyn community through the use of the church building for community events and social outreach. During the tenure of our former pastor these connections were enhanced by his, and our congregation's, friendship and interaction with community leaders and the rabbis and ministers of other congregations.

We believe we can offer our new pastor:

A congregation that cares for and supports each other;

A congregation that is engaged and willing to take on tasks needed to advance the church's mission;

A congregation that, although not large, historically has been generous in providing the funds necessary to continue the church's activities;

An organist of exceptional capability and an administrative staff that is highly qualified, committed to the church and reliable; and

A reservoir of goodwill in the community.

3. Explain the strategies or ideas that most excite your church in becoming or remaining missional.

Through a personal, neighborhood relationship developed by our former pastor, a local restaurateur established a mission using our church kitchen. During Superstorm Sandy, he recognized a need to feed people but did not have the facilities to do this at his disposal. He asked and was granted permission to use our facilities, and initiated what became known as the "Sandy Relief Kitchen." Fast forward to the Covid pandemic and the same person asked to use our kitchen to feed those impacted by Covid. The "Brooklyn Relief Kitchen" opened its doors and began to feed the hungry. Likewise, several years ago our church was approached by CAMBA to utilize our space as a summer "Respite Shelter" for homeless men. Our congregation acted as host, and with assistance of other local congregations shared our space, dinner, and our time with these men.

These examples typify how Old First likes to be "corporately" missional. We exist in a neighborhood once described by Rabbi Bachman as the most "fortunate neighborhood in the history of man," but we are surrounded by those in need. We feel the burden to help our neighbors and are excited when presented with an opportunity to use our facility and our abilities to be that parish church that lifts our neighbors up.

We also have grass roots mission initiatives that excite our congregation. We currently have an ad hoc Remembrance and Racial Justice Working Group which was borne out of a "White Supremacy and Me" reading group, that is doing exciting work in initiating our path into social justice mission. Additionally we use our building and considerable musical talents to engage our community with events like "Chocolate Chip Chamber Music," "Baroquelyn," and the "Brooklyn Bluegrass Bash."

Lastly, the "Arts at Old First" group hosts a series called Art and Faith and has featured memoirists, essayists, novelists, poets, and historians, including Darnell Moore, Christian Wiman, Steven Waldman, Mary Gordon, Paul Elie, David Ritz, Fr. James Martin, Carey Wallace, Cara Wall, Darcey Steinke, Rick Moody, and others. These events speak to timely social issues (race, climate, homosexuality) and topics of interest to people of faith (prayer, finding God in unlikely places) which bring in community members and challenge us in our mission to them.

4. Name three of your church's most passionate hopes and why they are significant.

To inspire compassion, humility, and an ardent love of the world through a deep engagement with scripture.

To provide beauty and comfort to our community by becoming a hub for the arts and a shelter for groups such as Alcoholics Anonymous, the hungry, and the homeless.

To actively pursue social justice and help our community and city work toward economic, racial, and gender equity.

5. How do you hope someone who visits your church would describe what s/he considers to be most important?

Often, in hearing testimonies from new members, or new active participants to the church, they mention that they were drawn in by statements posted on the church bulletin board, or the rainbow flag next to it: we proclaimed Old First to be a welcoming, equality-affirming space where diversity is accepted and more, encouraged. People who in the past had felt they had to sit in the back, not knowing if they could participate or would be accepted, saw that they were invited and made to feel at home. Our church has also undergone an "awakening" in the sense of a felt need for social justice/action and LGBTQ+ affirming policies. We have been blessed with excellent leadership and spiritual guidance/preaching, which has supported increased service and outreach to the community, and we hope that this will continue with a new pastor. Old First is our spiritual "home," and we hope that any person visiting will feel this way as well.

6. Name at least one challenge facing your new pastor.

We are a relatively small congregation with a fairly ambitious agenda. We are especially engaged with various neighborhood activities. There is always a concern that we will overstretch our volunteer base.

Old First has a large, beautiful building that is also very expensive to maintain.

Park Slope is a secular neighborhood with a geographically mobile population

During the pandemic, our congregation has mostly met and operated online. Even after we return to our new normal, some of this online programming will continue. This will require the new pastor to be digitally proficient.

Old First is a congregation of highly skilled individuals, many of whom are at the pinnacle of their fields.

7. Describe your vision and hopes for your church and your pastor over the next five years.

In some ways, our vision for the next five years is to continue emphasizing areas in which our church has exhibited strength in the past. Old First's congregation especially prizes its community involvement. This includes collaborating with other Brooklyn churches, synagogues, and mosques. Old First has also recently joined Room for All, and Consistory is considering becoming part of the Reformed Association. Being an inclusive church community that supports and provides ministry to Brooklyn's BIPOC and LGBTQ+ populations is also very important to the congregation.

Community involvement also means allowing various arts groups to use our large building and collaborating with various nonprofits that serve the local population. For instance, in recent years Old First has hosted the Brooklyn Relief Kitchen that seeks to tackle



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food insecurity in the wake of disasters such as Superstorm Sandv and the COVID-19 pandemic; provided financial and volunteer support for CHIPS a local soup kitchen and food pantry; hosted a summer homeless shelter through CAMBA; and provided support for various addiction programs. In our recent congregational survey many people expressed a vision to increase Old First's community involvement even more. As one person put it at the end of a long list of ways that Old First could be involved in the community, "Working with these types of support and relief organizations feels central to our congregation's mission." In order to achieve this vision, our new pastor needs to share the congregation's communitymindedness.

The congregation's vision for the next five years also involves having a minister who emphasizes preaching and the continued use of traditional liturgy. Both of these points were expressed repeatedly in the congregational survey. One worship area that the new pastor might emphasize more than has been done in the past is children's ministry. Old First also needs to improve its ministry to teens and young adults.

Ensuring that our new pastor has a clear vision for Old First and can share that vision is also important to the congregation. One hope we have for the next five years is to see our congregation grow. Increasing Old First's congregation will make it easier to achieve other priorities such as continuing our active involvement in the local community. Finding a new minister with strong skills in pastoral care and counseling is also important.
